LONG FORM SYNOPSIS



Recon Commando is an immersive feature-length hybrid documentary that resurrects the voice of a young soldier caught in the crucible of one of America's most divisive wars. In November 1967, Specialist 5 David "Recondo Dave" Barmettler of the 101st Airborne recorded a reel-to-reel audio letter home to his family for Christmas. What begins as a heartfelt message soon unfolds into a raw, unfiltered chronicle of jungle warfare, near-death encounters, and the unbreakable bond of brotherhood forged among his reconnaissance unit—nicknamed "The Dirty Dozen." His words, preserved for over half a century, form the emotional spine of this film.

Through his voice, audiences are transported into the "green hell" of Vietnam, where guerilla warfare blurred the line between survival and sacrifice. Dave's reflections capture the contradictions of war: the terror of ambushes, the fleeting moments of laughter among comrades, the philosophical musings of a young man who once studied for the seminary, and the quiet longing for home that echoes beneath every firefight. His story is not one of generals and strategies, but of soldiers on the ground—boys turned men in the span of a single tour.

The film blends authentic archival materials—rare photographs, 16mm combat footage, and Department of the Army Special Photographic Office reels—with cutting-edge Al-enhanced re-enactments that reconstruct the immediacy of Dave's memories. This fusion of past and present creates a visceral cinematic experience: the grain of the tape, the flicker of film, and the stylized realism of reconstructed imagery combine to immerse audiences in both the history and the humanity of the Vietnam War.

It asks audiences not only to witness history, but to feel it—through the voice of one man who lived it, and through the echoes of a generation that still reverberate today.

DAVID BARMETTLER SP5

Dave as a calm and confident man who had experienced much in life and was generous enough to share his knowledge and his philosophies. Some of his friends and war bretheren would refer to him as Shane, nick-named after the character of the "Shane" book series about a cool and collected cowboy hero who represents a firmness and dependability that everyone can count on and he fostered a general feeling of well-being that nothing harmful can occur. He is the personification of stability.

RECON COMMANDO MEDIC

He received a Purple Heart medal for injury sustained in battle and a Bronze Star medal for Meritorious Acheivement in Ground Operations Against Hostile Forces for the period of 2/17/67 to 2/16/68.

David Barmettler SP5 was in the U.S. Army Reconnaissance (Recon) Platoon, Headquarters & Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion, 502nd Infantry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 101st Airborne Division.

SEMINARY GRADUATE

Dave was from a family of eleven children and grew up in Omaha, NE. Dave was an idealist and studied philosophy in the Catholic Seminary for years before going to Vietnam. Responding to world events, he decided that he could better serve humanity and his country by enlisting in the ranks of "the Best of the Best" and he joined the 101st Airborne. He died in 1987 at the age of 47 from malenoma skin cancer caused by Agent Orange. The army denied it was the cause of his death but later recinded their evaluation and paid retributions to his family.

DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

J.J. BARMETTLER

"Recon Commando is more than a war story—it is a voice from the past, preserved on fragile magnetic tape, that speaks directly to us today. My uncle, Specialist 5 David Barmettler, recorded his Christmas letter home in 1967 while serving as a Recon Commando in the 101st Airborne. His words capture the contradictions of war: fear and courage, loss and brotherhood, despair and hope.

I chose to fuse archival footage with Al-enhanced re-enactments not to fictionalize, but to reconstruct memory—to give visual form to the soldier's voice and to bridge the gap between history and present-day audiences. This hybrid form allows us to experience the war as he lived it: immediate, visceral, and deeply human.

My aspiration is that veterans, families, and audiences everywhere will find in this film not only a window into the Vietnam War, but also a mirror for their own struggles with memory, resilience, and reconciliation."

Joseph "J.J" Barmettler is a filmmaker and artist with a catalog of feature length films, documentary, television and music programs. 






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
